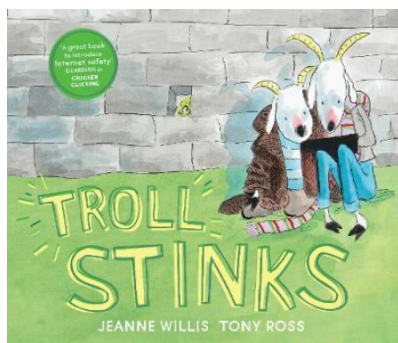




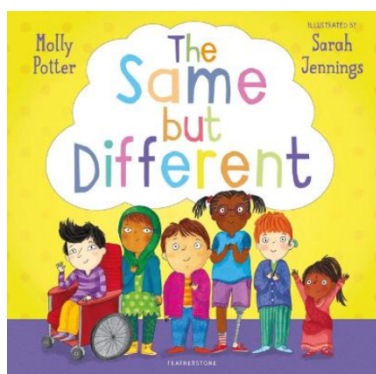

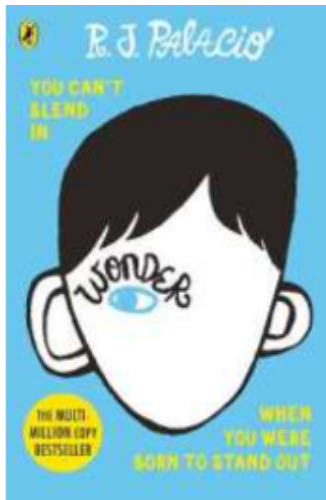
This book covers lots of ways we are different, including how we look, where we live, the languages we speak, what our families are like and what we believe in.

With spare, powerful text and richly-imagined illustrations, We're All Wonders shows readers what it's like to live in Auggie's world - a world



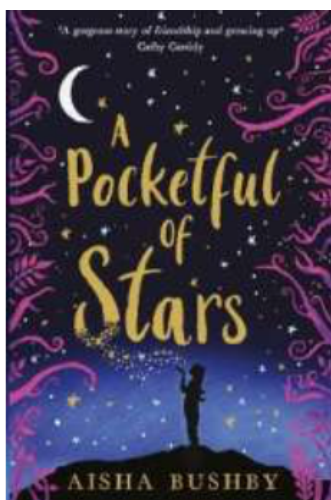
'My name is August. I won't describe what I look like. Whatever you're thinking, it's probably worse.'

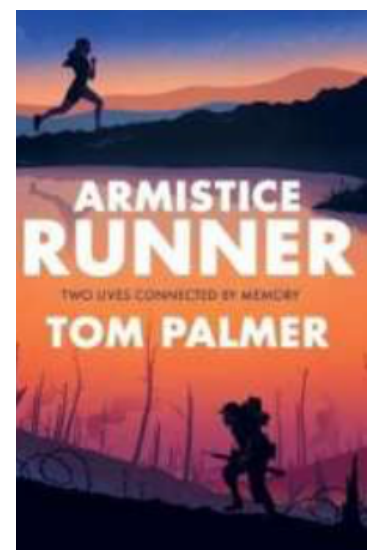
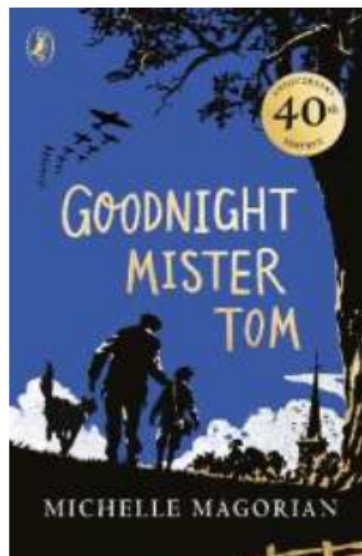
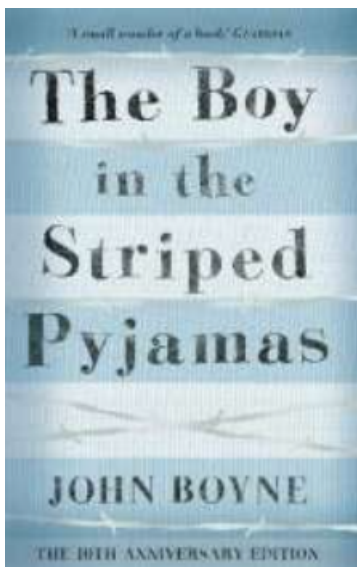
A funny, frank, astonishingly moving debut - and a true global phenomenon - to read in one sitting, pass on to others, and remember long after the final page.
